
OLDER AMERICANS ACT FUNDING

For more than 50 years, the Older Americans Act (OAA) has been the primary piece of federal legislation supporting the social and nutritional needs of our country's most at-risk seniors.

Nationally, the OAA funds 39% OF THE TOTAL AMOUNT SPENT to provide nutritious meals, safety checks and friendly visits to 2.4 MILLION SENIORS EACH YEAR


OTHER SOURCES

The other 61% of funds spent to serve seniors each year comes from state and/or local sources, private donations from foundations, corporations and individuals, and federal block grants.

Aging issues are often forgotten, with LESS THAN 2% of all corporate, community and family philanthropy going to organizations like Meals on Wheels

Meals on Wheels is now **SERVING 21M FEWER MEALS** than in 2005 because food, transportation and other costs have increased while funding remains stagnant
